Robotics competition – April 25

Four of SJUSD's high schools were contenders in the 18th annual Silicon Valley Regional FIRST Robotics Competition held at SJSU's Event Center. Leland, Pioneer, San Jose High and Willow Glen High created their robots to compete in a medieval-themed quest where teams needed to create alliances and strategies with other teams in order to win. The teams had just 6 weeks to strategize, design, build and test their robots to compete in this fast-moving game. They all did a fantastic job!

All teacher award – April 26

One of our own, Scott Krijnen, a teacher at Castillero Middle School is a finalist for the CSN Bay Area All Star Teacher award. Scott is being recognized for his accomplishments and achievements with the school's visual and performing arts program. If Scott wins, Castillero Middle School will receive \$20,000.

Grant for the library – May 19

Bret Harte Middle school received a grant from bestselling author James Patterson to help support its school library. Scholastic Reading Club also matched each dollar with bonus points that teachers used to acquire books and other materials for their classroom. Bret Harte was one of 467 schools selected from 27,924 applications.

"These are two phenomenal women who devote their time to helping people who are escaping violence or going without basic resources," Wieckowski said. "They are providing assistance when it is most needed to families in Alameda and Santa Clara Counties."

Phillips, who also serves as the activities director at Lincoln High, helped turn Lincoln's Spirit of Giving donation drive into a year-round donation pantry for underprivileged students. Phillips had heard about a similar pantry in North Carolina.

Lincoln has a large number of students from low-income families, but the pantry is for any student in need. A student can go to the pantry and receive a toothbrush, gift card or other items for free.

State Schools Chief Tom Torlakson Reports New Record High School Graduation Rate and Sixth Consecutive Year of an Increase

SACRAMENTO, May 17 — State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson today reported California's cohort graduation rate climbed for the sixth year in a row in 2015 to a record high, with the biggest jump taking place among English Learners and migrant students.

Among students who started high school in 2011–12, 82.3 percent graduated with their class in 2015, up 1.3 percentage points from the year before. (See Table 1.) This increase means that 2,900 more students received their high school diploma last year than the year before. The state's graduation rate has increased substantially since the class of 2010 posted a 74.7 percent rate.

State Schools Superintendent Tom Torlakson Announces Statusof Teacher Recruitment and Training Bills at State Capitol

Sacramento, June 8 – State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson announced today that legislation is advancing at the state Capitol to help address a growing shortage of teachers in California.

Several bills moved forward last week as the Legislature faced a bill deadline. Torlakson spoke in favor of the legislation at a Capitol news conference earlier in the year, when legislators introduced new measures to recruit more educators and help them earn teaching credentials.

"I will continue to work with all members of the Legislature who want to help talented and committed people enter this rewarding profession," said Torlakson, who started his career as a science teacher and coach. "I am spreading the message when I speak at the state Capitol and at schools and events all around the state: California needs more teachers. Teaching is a wonderful profession with challenges—but also great rewards. Teachers have the opportunity to have a profound positive impact in a young person's life."

Enrollment in California's teacher preparation programs fell from more than 40,000 students during the 2008–09 school year to less than 20,000 in 2012–13.

In 2014–15, the Commission on Teacher Credentialing issued 15,000 credentials, while the California Department of Education (CDE) projected the need for California schools to hire 22,000 teachers.

The Legislature last week had a "house of origin" deadline, which means legislation introduced in the Senate in 2016 had to pass to the Assembly, and Assembly bills needed to pass to the Senate.

The Legislature has until August 31 to pass any bills in the 2015–16 session, and Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr. must sign or veto bills by September 30.

Bills that Torlakson supports include SB 915 by Senator Carol Liu, D-La Canada Flintridge. This bill reestablishes the California Center on Teaching Careers (Cal Teach) to recruit qualified individuals into the teaching profession. The program boosted teacher recruitment through outreach campaigns in the 1990s but was discontinued due to state budget cuts. SB 915 passed the Senate 28-8 and is pending in the Assembly. SB 933 by Senator Ben Allen, D-Santa Monica, would create a California Teacher Corps program that provides matching grants to local school districts to create or expand teacher residency programs. SB 933 passed the Senate 37-0 and is also pending in the Assembly.

Torlakson also sponsored SB 62, by Senator Fran Pavley, D-Agoura Hills, to reinstate and improve a phased-out state program to provide student loan forgiveness to new teachers. Under the Assumption Program of Loans for Education (APLE), a new teacher would teach for four years at a school with large numbers of disadvantaged students or at a rural school. This bill was introduced last year and is pending in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Torlakson also supports several other bills to expand and increase funding for teacher training. Information is available at the Legislative Information website. In addition, those seeking more information about how to become a teacher can find it at Teach California.
